YEAR 12 FOOD - WHO ATE ALL THE PIES?

Year 12 students thought all their dreams had come at once when they were outlined their latest task. Instead of cooking vegetables (mostly at Mrs Keeffe's insistence), they could actually plan a pie of their choice to bake.

The task included an understanding of food labelling requirements in Australia - all twelve separate pieces of information that need to be included on each and every food product sold in Australia.

Last week was the culmination of this learning – students could bake the pie they had planned - using plenty of skills in making shortcrust and puff pastry by hand. Their design needed to suit the requirement of being a pie that could be sold at a take-away outlet. Cooking in pairs, they produced; beef & onion pie, chicken & tomato pie, mince & potato pie, shepherd's pie and spinach & feta pie.

All looked delicious and were professionally produced – there were certainly a lot of happy bakers in the class.

Year 12s will now set about designing a package for their pies that would meet labelling requirements and be suitable for sale.

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


YEAR 10 EXCURSION

All this learning came together during an excursion to Mogumber.




Following this bush food hunt, the class travelled to the now abandoned Mogumber Mission site where stolen Aboriginal children were taken from 1914 until late in the century. Ms Chipper gave the students a fascinating insight to the area and the life for Aboriginal people who lived at the Mission — and of their parents, many of whom moved to be nearer their children, but were forced to live outside the Mission.

The site of the life story of the movie *The Rabbit Proof Fence*, many students found the local history very interesting, recognising many local family names from the cemetery wall.

Students had a very interesting day, in all, though, most were very grateful for the packed lunch given our overall very low success rate of finding edible bush food! Many thanks to Ms Chipper for her remarkable contribution to the excursion and her personal story that she shared during the day.

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AUTOMOTIVES TRAILER PROJECT

This semester the Year 12 General Automotives class has spent many weeks planning and then repairing the school trailer, which is used every year to transport luggage to the Country Week carnival.

The trailer is 20 years old and was in a very poor state. The damage ranged from body issues of extensive rust and old flaky paint that was practically dusting off on our hands, to faulty brakes, broken jockey wheel, and worn rims and bearings.

We spread the work between us to ensure everyone had a go at different panel and mechanical repair skills. We started by cutting and grinding out the rust. The engineering students in the group welded patches and sealed up the holes and leaks in the metal plating. Buffing discs were used for the surface rust.

Once the majority of the rust was removed, and the rest was treated with rust convertor, we mixed and spread bog over the rust affected areas. Students then got to work smoothing out the bogged areas and sanding off the old paint. When the surface was ready, a red primer was sprayed to ensure a strong surface for the final blue coat to be sprayed onto.

We shared spray painting work for the 2 coats and touch up work. The tyres were also removed from their rims, for the rims to be buffed and sprayed also. The tyres were refitted and wheels put securely back on the trailer. The final touch was the sign writing decals.

We look forward to the future Country Week tours being able to benefit for our class's hard work, for many more years.

Our class is grateful to Concept Signs and Workwear for the quality job in putting the signs on the trailer.

On behalf of the General Automotives class of 2023 I want to say a big thank you to McIntosh & Son of Moora for the generous donation of the automotive paint for our project. Our trailer is proudly New Holland.


